Trophy Fish - Based on Weight Minimum Weights to Qualify

Species	Min. Weight
Arctic Char/Dolly Varden	10 pounds
Brook Trout	3 pounds
Burbot	8 pounds
Chum salmon	10 pounds
Coho salmon	15 pounds
Cutthroat trout (sea-run)	3 pounds
Arctic grayling	3 pounds
Halibut	200 pounds
King salmon (<i>from waters other than the Kenai River</i>)	40 pounds
Lake trout	20 pounds
Lingcod	50 pounds
Northern pike	15 pounds
Pink salmon	6 pounds
Nonpelagic Rockfish (<i>see qualifying species on next page</i>)	18 pounds
Pelagic Rockfish (<i>see qualifying species on next page</i>)	10 pounds
Rainbow/Steelhead trout	15 pounds
Sablefish (Black Cod)	10 pounds
Sheefish	30 pounds
Sockeye salmon	12 pounds
Whitefish	4 pounds

Minimum weights for Trophy Fish certificates are listed in the table above. Entries must be weighed in the presence of a witness and a Trophy Fish Official (can be the same person) and on a scale certified by the Division of Weights and Measures.

Nonpelagic rockfish

While any nonpelagic rockfish species would qualify for a trophy based on weight, the more commonly caught nonpelagic rockfish that would generally meet the minimum weight requirements include, yelloweye, silvergray, shortraker, and roughey. Always use a deepwater release mechanism to release rockfish that are not harvested.

Pelagic rockfish

While any pelagic rockfish species would qualify for a trophy based on weight, the more commonly caught pelagic rockfish that would generally meet the minimum weight requirements include, black, yellowtail, and widow. Always use a deepwater release mechanism to release rockfish that are not harvested.

Fish must be weighed by a Trophy Fish official on a certified scale.
